Professor Kruse specializes in the political, social, and urban/suburban history of twentieth-century America, with a particular interest in conflicts over race, rights and religion and the making of modern conservatism. He is the author of *White Flight: Atlanta and the Making of Modern Conservatism* (2005), *One Nation Under God: How Corporate America Invented Christian America* (2015), and, with Julian Zelizer, *Fault Lines: A History of the United States since 1974* (2019). He has been honored recently as a Distinguished Lecturer by the Organization of American Historians, a Fellow of the Guggenheim Foundation, and an elected member of the Society of American Historians.
